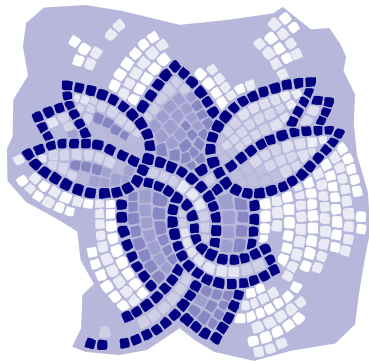

## From the Minister's Desk

*Unless I see in his hands the print of the nails, and place my finger in the Mark of the nails, and place my hand in his side, I will not believe."*

*John 20:25*

The Disciple Thomas became known as "Doubting Thomas" because of his demand for physical evidence – *proof* – of Jesus' resurrection. Thomas was, of course, "unitarian" because the trinity (and "trinitarian") would not be invented for another three hundred years; no one in the first century questioned that God existed as a unity. But perhaps Thomas was also one of us - a Unitarian - questioning, demanding proof, taking nothing at face value.

I was reminded of Thomas recently when a parishioner inquired about my planned Easter sermon. The query was followed with an interesting observation: "Unitarian ministers seem to have a problem with Easter..." It is difficult and for several reasons. The diversity of theology among parishioners, for example. Even if we are theists, preaching the story of Jesus' death and resurrection strains credulity. Preaching the "Passion of Christ" as a metaphor for the promise of new life leads to such issues as how we understand death. Is it final? Is there life after death? Or, are we reincarnated until we finally "get it right?"

For many, Easter is the Christian equivalent of pagan festivals celebrating the return of the high sun, long days and the season of rebirth. It is easier to talk about the crocus and daffodil – the return of Life from Death – than the Savior. But how do we to reconcile such a diversion with our claim of being "inheritors of the Judeo-Christian tradition?"

So, what do Unitarian Universalists – ministers and members – believe about Easter? And, how do we celebrate it? For many the best way is to stay home, fill the starter trays with potting soil and sewing seeds -- beginning the renewal of life right there on their window sills. If they "take," well... close the church, nourish the new life and resume theology and philosophy in the fall.

We are a diverse group we Unitarian Universalists! I look forward to a service that celebrates the joy of new life, however we choose to celebrate it. And regardless of what you believe or how you celebrate it, I am confident we all look forward to green grass, budding leaves and the final disappearance of snow.

It is my hope that members and friends will attend the Unitarian Universalist Joseph Priestley District's annual conference which is being held in Wilmington, DE. Reverend David W. Farrington, or “Reverend Dave,” as he’s affectionately known by members of the Fellowship, came to us in November, 2008 after a long and distinguished career in both ministry and the private sector. As a leader in the Massachusetts prison reform movement, director of several pre-release centers for felons and teacher of penology at Boston University, Dave worked in corrections until 1982 when he decided to become a business consultant in private industry.

Having completed his Master’s of Divinity at Andover-Newton Theological School in 1999, Dave worked as a chaplain in various hospitals, retirement homes and mental health facilities. Additionally, he served churches in the states of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts and Texas, prior to accepting a full-time position as minister at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship in Pottstown.

According to Dave, the thing he finds most rewarding about ministry is the chance to be of service to others, particularly those in crisis. In just a few short months, he has already become actively involved in all facets of life at the Fellowship, both administrative and pastoral. His Sunday sermons, filled with real-life experiences from his fascinating life, have a depth and quality that seem to resonate with every individual in attendance.

Reverend Dave’s vision for the Fellowship includes its playing a leading and visionary role as “a force for justice in the larger community.” He has already begun to work with the Social Justice Committee on its micro-finance project and hopes to greatly expand the Fellowship’s influence not only in Pottstown, but within the larger Unitarian Universalist movement as a whole.

A family man, Dave raised his daughter Carolyn and still considers an ideal day as one spent with family – story-telling and “feasting,” preferably on quality ethnic foods! A supporter of the New England Patriots and avid Red Sox fan, Reverend Dave’s hobbies include amateur radio, radio control modeling, genealogy, enjoying his cats, and reading the collected works of his favorite poet, Robert Frost.

His office door is always open, and he looks forward to getting to know “UU,” too!

This magical place seems to appear out of nothing for a week each summer. The Unitarian Universalist Mid-Atlantic Community (UUMAC) is surely one of the most intentionally happy, thoughtful and open places. We are many things—a spiritual retreat, a family summer camp, an institute for learning and exploration, a weeklong party and reunion of kindred souls. We play games and instruments, sing, listen, discuss, learn, worship, visit, laugh, work, eat, (and sometimes sleep), shop for books in the UUMAC bookstore, dance and nosh at Night Owls, and paint faces and toenails at the Carnival. One recent teen described his new college as “UUMAC with homework”—high praise for both his college and for UUMAC. Come as you are; all are welcome.

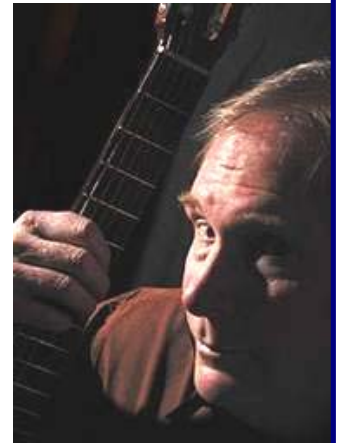
For the week of UUMAC, we live on the campus of DeSales University, in Center Valley, Pennsylvania, near Allentown. The University has air-conditioned dorms, classrooms and some of the best cafeteria food you can imagine. No joke, we work with the staff on the food and it is wonderful! DeSales has a commitment to serving people with different abilities, and consequently, appropriate space is available with prior notice.

Programming at UUMAC is a balance of activity according to age grouping and across age barriers. Children, teens and adults each have programming geared to their interests. As well, ages mingle for off-campus trips, evening activities and those impromptu moments that WILL keep on happening!

Like the fabled Scottish town of Brigadoon, UUMAC appears once a year, to the delight of all its participants, and then disappears, except in memory, until the next year. Join us this July 19-25.

***For our 2009 Theme Speaker--Jim Scott*** UU Activist/UU Artist

Over the past 24 years Jim Scott visited approximately 500 UU Churches across the US, Canada and the United Kingdom, leading services, providing special music for services, presenting benefit concerts, and offering workshops. His new CD, Gather the Spirit features many of his songs included in the UU Hymnbook and the new Singing the Journey songbook. Gather the Spirit has become one of the most used hymns across the denomination and Jim's music is sung from church choirs to campfires.



Formerly the Co-Chair of the UU Ministry for the Earth, Jim helped create the "Green Sanctuary" program. He was awarded a grant from the Fund for Unitarian Universalism to create The Earth and Spirit Songbook, a collection of over 100 songs of earth and peace by many contemporary composers, providing worship and RE materials that celebrate these ideals. A past board member of the UU Musicians' Network as well, Jim has long been at the forefront of the movement for new music in the denomination.

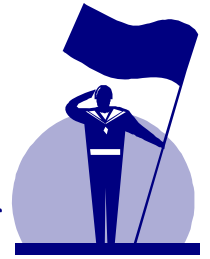
Years of activism reflect in Jim's work. His songs, poetry and short stories address issues of ecology, justice and peace with insight and gentle wit. As a member of the Paul Winter Consort, Jim was co-creator of the monumental choral work Missa Gaia/Earth Mass. His list of published choral works continues to grow and his musical creativity includes soundtracks for PBS, a stage musical, and many recordings of songs.

Jim's musical-activist journeys include concert collaborations with renowned Jazz, Classical, and Folk artists as well as numerous concerts with choirs. He regularly performs his engaging songs for children in schools and intergenerational concerts.

## ***Eyes Wide Open Across Pennsylvania*** is coming to Collegeville



The impact of the Iraq War on Pennsylvania is the focus of the exhibit ***Eyes Wide Open Across Pennsylvania***. This exhibit features over 170 pairs of combat boots memorializing the U.S. soldiers from Pennsylvania who have died in the Iraq War. In addition, an Iraqi exhibit of 50 shoes and posters raises awareness of the huge number of Iraqi civilian casualties.



The exhibit will open at Thomas Paine UU Fellowship **noon, Saturday, April 18<sup>th</sup>**, with an opening speaker and will close for the day at 9:00 PM. A candlelight vigil will be held at 7:00 PM. The exhibition will be available **noon to 4 PM Sunday, April 19<sup>th</sup>**.

Local peacemakers affiliated with Thomas Paine UU Fellowship are sponsoring the exhibit. Since the spring of 2006 ***Eyes Wide Open Across PA*** has been traveling around the state in urban areas and small towns, bringing awareness of the human cost of this war.

**AFSC** (American Friends Service Committee), an international social justice organization, originally created ***Eyes Wide open: The Human Cost of War*** to illustrate the lives lost in the war in Iraq. The national ***Eyes Wide Open*** exhibit, which first opened in Chicago with 500 pairs of boots in January 2004, Making the exhibit too large to transport. **AFSC** is now concentration on establishing state exhibits. The national death toll is now over 4,200 U.S. military casualties.

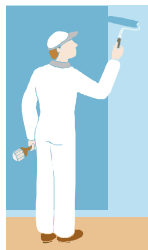
